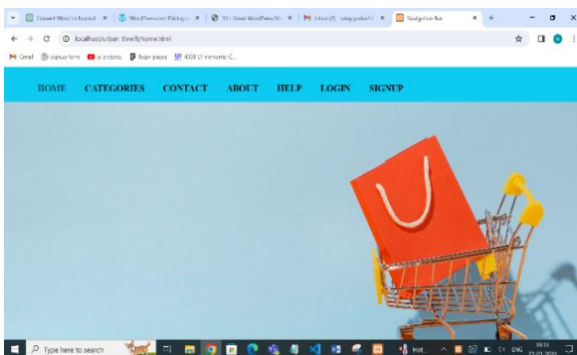
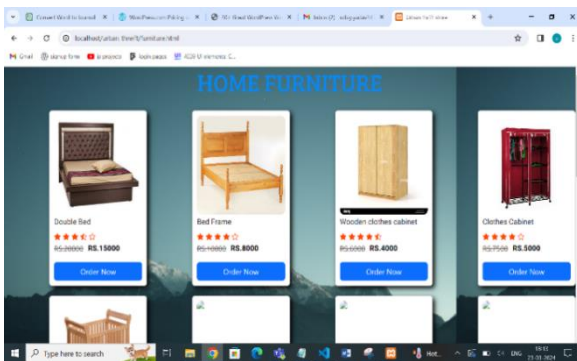
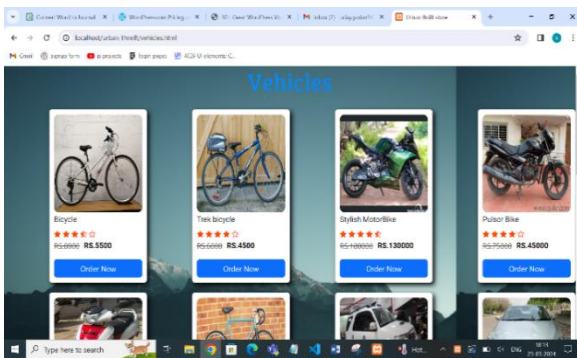
XAMPP: XAMPP is a cross-platform software package that includes Apache (web server), MySQL
